# Adoremus at Oscott—Saturday 14 September

The 2024 National Eucharistic Congress takes place at St Mary's College, Oscott on 14 September. Adoremus is an ongoing programme. The event at Oscott is taking place in the spirit of the Liverpool Adoremus in 2018. It is related to the International Eucharistic Congress also taking place in September, and is preparatory to the Jubilee in 2025, and is not therefore an isolated event. Wednesday 14 August is the Feast Day of **St Maximilian Kolbe**. Born in 1894 in occupied Poland, he joined the Franciscans in Lwów in 1910, and was ordained eight years later,. Maximilian believed that Christians must fight for the world's salvation with all the means of modern communication. He founded a newspaper, and a sodality called the Knights of Mary Immaculate, which spread widely in Poland and abroad. He founded a community, a "city of Mary," at Teresin: centred round the Franciscan friary. In 1930 he went to Japan, studied Buddhism and Shintoism, and spread the Christian message in a way that was in harmony with Japanese culture. He was recalled to Poland in 1936 on health grounds.

When Hitler invaded Poland, the community at Teresin sheltered thousands of refugees, most of them Jews. In 1941 Maximilian was arrested and sent to at Auschwitz. When a prisoner escaped, and in reprisal the authorities chose ten people to die by starvation, Maximilian offered to take the place of one of the men chosen, as he had a family. The man he saved was present at the ceremony for Maximilian's canonisation in 1982.

If today, 11 August, were not a Sunday we would be celebrating the **Feast of St Clare**. Inspired by Francis of Assisi, she became the first abbess of the order of the Poor Clares at San Damiano in Assisi in 1215. The emphasis was on gospel poverty. They possessed no property, even in common, subsisting on daily contributions. Clare's influence was such that popes, cardinals, and bishops often consulted her.

The 41 years of Clare's religious life are scenarios of sanctity: a resolve to lead the simple, literal gospel life; courageous resistance to the ever-present pressure to dilute the ideal; a passion for poverty and humility; an ardent life of prayer; and a generous concern for her sisters.

#### Mass Setting - Mass of Christ the Saviour

Gloria 1013; Holy, Holy 1014; Memorial Acclamation 1016-1017; Lamb of God 1019

The commemoration of the death of the Blessed Virgin Mary is known as the Assumption because of the tradition that her body did not decay but that she was raised up, body and soul, into heaven. This tradition was widespread by the beginning of the 20th century, and in 1950 Pope Pius XII, infallibly declared the Assumption to be part of the doctrine of the universal Church.

Scripture does not give an account of Mary's Assumption into heaven. But *Revelation, chapter 12*, speaks of a woman caught up in the battle between good and evil. Many see this woman as God's people. Since Mary best embodies the people of both the Old and New Testament, her Assumption can be seen as an exemplification of the woman's victory.

In *1 Corinthians* Paul speaks of Christ's resurrection as the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. Since Mary is closely associated with all the mysteries of Jesus' life, it is not surprising that the Holy Spirit has led the Church to believe in Mary's share in his glorification. So close was she to Jesus on earth, she must be with him body and soul in heaven.
