A Time for Growth

The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord brings the Christmas season to a close. We will then be moving into that season the church calls “**Ordinary Time**” until Ash Wednesday on 18 February.

In this context, we must not rely on some of the dictionary definitions of “ordinary”, such as average, run-of-the-mill, undistinguished, mediocre, and indifferent. In the Church’s “Ordinary Time”, the word derives from the Latin *ordinalis*, meaning “numbered” or “ruled”.

It is a season when we are being neither single-mindedly penitent nor overwhelmingly joyful. It is, nevertheless, a time for learning, for growth and new life (symbolised by the green altar cloths and vestments), for giving thanks for and being active participants in the everyday life of Jesus. This is most certainly **not** a season for mediocrity or indifference.


Parish Outreach meeting this Monday 12 January.

Reflecting on our Baptism

The Solemnity of The Baptism of the Lord, which we celebrate today, is the last of three great manifestations or revelations of the Christmas season: **Christmas**, when God comes among us with the Good News for the poor, the outcast and the sinner; **Epiphany**, when God comes among us with a message of salvation for all the people of the world, not just for one select group; **The Baptism of Jesus**, when God is seen as specially present in Jesus and working in him and through him.

It is an opportunity for us to reflect on our own baptism. That is not something which happened a long time and which “made” us Catholics. It is not just a ceremony lasting a few minutes which produces magical effects; it is the beginning of a lifelong journey; of a process of growing into the Body of Christ as its members. Our baptism is essentially a community experience, not just a private or a family event.

It involves active participation in the life of the Church and not just passive membership. Each one of us is called to be a living witness to the Gospel: to be the salt of the earth, a city on a hill, a lamp radiating light for all. Our baptism is a never-ending call to follow in the footsteps of Jesus. So let us today renew our faith in and our commitment to follow Jesus. Let us re-affirm our readiness to carry on his work. Without our co-operation, much of God’s work will never get done.

This Tuesday we celebrate the feast day of **Saint Hilary of Poitiers**, Bishop and Doctor of the Church. In the early days of the Christian Roman Empire in the 4th Century, he was elected - against his will - Bishop of Poitiers in 350, and fought long, theological battles against the Arians, who denied the divinity of Christ, at a time when their heresy was threatening to overrun the Western Church. This brought him into conflict with emperors and some fellow bishops, and resulted in his exile for four years. He continued his work during and after his exile, dying around 368.

Christ said his coming would bring not peace but a sword (Matthew 10:34). The Gospels offer no support for us if we fantasise about a sunlit holiness that knows no problems. Christ did not escape at the last moment, after a life of controversy, problems, pain and frustration. Hilary, like all saints, followed in his Master’s footsteps.

who, when Christ had been baptised

and as the Holy Spirit descended upon him,
