

Adoremus at Oscott - Saturday 14 September

The 2024 National Eucharistic Congress takes place at St Mary's College, Oscott on 14 September. Adoremus is an ongoing programme. The event at Oscott is taking place in the spirit of the Liverpool Adoremus in 2018. It is related to the International Eucharistic Congress also taking place in September, and is preparatory to the Jubilee in 2025, and is not therefore an isolated event. This Thursday we celebrate the Feast of Our Lady, Mother and Queen. Pius XII established this feast in 1954. The doctrine of the Assumption was promulgated in 1951. As was normal for the greater feasts, this celebration was echoed throughout the following week, and. We remember that the Blessed Virgin reigns in heaven together with her Son. She reigns not because she is in any way equal to God but because she is the mother of Christ the King. Her privileges come from her willingly agreeing to become the Mother of God and make our redemption possible.

This coming Tuesday, 20 August, is the Feast Day of **St Bernard.** In the year 1111, aged 20, Bernard joined the monastic community of Citeaux. His five brothers, two uncles, and some 30 young friends followed him. Within four years, a dying community had recovered enough vitality to establish a new house in the nearby valley of Wormwoods, with Bernard as abbot. The valley was soon renamed Clairvaux, the valley of light. Bernard's life in the Church produced far-reaching results. He was an adviser to popes, defender of the faith, healer of a schism, reviver of the Cistercian Order, scripture scholar, theologian, and eloquent preacher. In all this he relied on many hours of prayer and contemplation to give him strength and direction. His life was also characterised by a deep devotion to the Blessed Mother. His sermons and books about Mary are still the standard of Marian theology. His leading role in promoting the disastrous Second Crusade to the Holy Land weighed heavily on Bernard, and this burden possibly hastened his death on August 20th, 1153.

Pope's August prayer intention: For political leaders

In his prayer intention for this month, the Holy Father asks us to pray "that political leaders be at the service of their own people, working for integral human development and the common good, taking caring of those who have lost their jobs and giving priority to the poorest."

Pope Francis acknowledges that politics does not have a very good reputation." Nonetheless, he says, politics properly so-called – as opposed to "politicking" – "listens to what is really going on... is at the service of the poor... is concerned for the unemployed."

"If we look at it in this way," the Pope says, "politics is much more noble than it appears."

So, he says, as we pray for political leaders, we should also be grateful "for the many politicians who carry out their duties with a will to serve, not of power, who put all their efforts toward the common good."

Saturday 24 August, is the feast day of **St Bartholomew the Apostle.** In the New Testament, he is mentioned only in the lists of the apostles. Some scholars identify him with Nathanael, a man of Cana in Galilee. Like most of the apostles, we know almost nothing about him, yet the unknown ones were also foundation stones. Their personalities were secondary to their great office, using their first-hand experience, of speaking in the name of Jesus and putting the Word made flesh into human words for the enlightenment of the world.

Thought for the month

The month of August is traditionally dedicated to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. The physical heart of Mary is venerated (and not adored as the Sacred Heart of Jesus is) because it is united to her person and is the seat of her love (especially for her divine Son), virtue, and inner life. Such devotion is an incentive to a similar love and virtue. ' Love, serve and honour Mary with all your heart, and you will gain and possess entirely the heart of the Heavenly Father. He will love you and bless you abundantly, and she will repeat, after her Divine Son, "For the Father Himself loveth you, because you have loved me." Saint John Eudes **A Daily Prayer**
