We are now in the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, which runs from 18 – 25 January.

As we celebrate 1,700 years since the Council of Nicaea, the worship for the week has at its heart, the Nicene Creed. The scripture readings for this year focus on belief. We are invited to reflect on the story of Martha's confession of faith in Jesus as narrated in John 11:17-27. Each of us is called to sit with Jesus' provocative question to Martha: "Do you believe this?" ("this" being His words, "I am the resurrection.....whoever believes in me will never die.")

The Council of Nicaea is valued as a significant moment of shared history across the different Christian traditions, despite the many ways in which our paths may have diverged in the years since. Some have remained closer to the Church envisaged at Nicaea with the Nicene Creed continuing to be of central importance as a statement of faith, while others have adopted non-credal models of Church placing greater emphasis on other forms of expression of shared Christian faith. Looking back together from our different perspectives presents an opportunity to deepen understanding and relationships, strengthening our unity in diversity.

Ordinary Time

The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord last Sunday brought the Christmas season to a close. Until Ash Wednesday, which falls quite late this year on 5 March, we will be in "Ordinary Time" Not, ordinary according to dictionary definitions of the word, such as "average, run-of-the-mill, mediocre, indifferent, and undistinguished." In the Church's "Ordinary Time" the word refers to the Latin term ordinalis, meaning "numbered" or "ruled". It is a season when we are being neither single-mindedly penitent nor overwhelmingly joyful. And yet it is a time for learning, for growth (symbolised by the green vestments), for participating in and celebrating the everyday life of Jesus. This is certainly not a time for mediocrity or indifference.

This Saturday, 25 January, we celebrate the Feast of the Conversion of the St Paul. Described in Acts of the Apostles (9:1-22 and 22:3-16), the tentmaker from Tarsus's encounter with Jesus on the road to Damascus changed Saul, the zealous persecutor of Christians, into St Paul, the great founding Christian missionary theologian. Paul's life became a tireless proclaiming and living out of the message of the cross: Christians die baptismally to sin and are buried with Christ. They are made into a new creation, already sharing Christ's victory and someday to rise from the dead like him. Through this risen Christ, the Father pours out the Spirit on them, making them completely new.
