Novena to St Francis - For a world under threat

Nine brief reflections asking St Francis of Assisi to pray for us and our world, based on his beautiful Canticle of the Sun.

This novena is a song of penitence and praise, guiding us to care for the earth and for our most vulnerable sisters and brothers, especially the Amazon peoples. They are currently under grave risk from coronavirus, given their fragile situation, often in remote locations far from government services.

Communities with whom we work are reporting a sharp increase in predatory attacks on land. People smugglers are also active and those being trafficked are in more danger than ever, having no access to healthcare. The pandemic shows us that "we have not heard the cry of the poor and our seriously ill planet," warns Pope Francis, describing this as "a time to choose what matters and what passes away". (*Urbi et Orbi, 2020*) Use these prayers over nine days or at nine moments of personal prayer. Each has four phases: Canticle; Amazon voice; penitential prayer; plea for intercession.

Third prayer: Wind and air

"We praise you, Lord, for Brothers Wind and Air, fair and stormy, all weather's moods, by which you cherish all that you have made." (St Francis of Assisi)

"We ourselves are water, air, earth and life of this environment created by God." (Guaviare people, Colombia)

Creator God, we have disturbed the natural cycle, upset Earth's fragile balance. Forgive us for our lack of care.

St Francis, joyful steward of creation, you lived in peace with nature and with God. Inspired by your witness, may we defend our common home.

St Francis, pray for us.

21st Sunday A The Christian Disciple

In recent weeks we have seen how a disciple is someone: nourished by the bread of God's compassion, saved from sinking by the hand of God: persevering in faith like the Canaanite woman. Now we see that a true disciple is like Peter, blessed with the divine gift of faith.

Simon Peter is a headline or model of faith. A good model too, because he is moulded from ordinary clay. We do not stand back at a fearful distance from Simon as someone of unattainable perfection. We have seen his flesh and blood, being weak and strong, cold and hot, fearful and courageous.

And now into this vessel of ordinary clay God pours an extraordinary gift...faith. It is not your flesh and blood mixture that gave you this light, but my Father in heaven. Simon, son of Jonah, you are the recipient of a great blessing. Faith is a gift. In the gospel it is noticeable that Jesus was amazed when he met with someone who believed: and he was moved to bless the Father in thanksgiving for the faith of the little ones.

If you believe that Jesus is the Son of God and the saviour of the world, then you are truly blessed. You are more than a creature of flesh and blood. Like Simon, you deserve a new name. Like Simon, you too are a new Peter, a new rock in the temple of God's presence upon earth. Your faith will be a rock of foundation to give you strength to withstand the most severe storms and flood of life. Your faith will bring you the keys to open and close the doors of life's mysterious castle. You have the key to open up to God's forgiveness and to lock away the terrors of guilt. Your key will open up the light of wisdom, understanding and knowledge: and lock out the powers of darkness.

You have the key of faith to throw off the chains of fear and anxiety which restrict your growth: and to bind in chains the phantoms of terror which crawl up from the mind's cellar. You have the key to hope which sustains you. And the key to love, for if you believe in God's love, then you have the motive for overcoming every denial of love in your life: your love will be greater than the injuries it receives. In faith you have the key to salvation.

The day when Jesus, Son of Man, was recognised as the anointed leader of God's people, the very Son of God. The day when Simon, son of Jonah, is recognised as one blessed by the Father, newly anointed to be the rock that Jesus would build on. It was a decisive day in the transition from the dream of the kingdom to the reality of the church. The first stone had been set in place, let us continue to add more and truly become the spiritual stones making the spiritual House of God.

RETURNING TO CHURCH AND ATTENDING MASS (Updated)

Firstly, how wonderful it is to be able at last to attend Mass, albeit in a restricted manner.

In keeping with Government and Diocesan guidelines, the numbers able to attend each Mass are very restricted and MUST be adhered to. Social distancing must be observed. The expected number is 60 but this will be confirmed.

Please remember that Sunday obligation is still suspended so attending Mass any day of the week will count. If you are able to attend Mass during the week please do so and leave Saturday and Sunday to those who are working.

If you wish to attend **SUNDAY** Mass a telephone booking system will be in place (see below).

Coming to Mass

- 1. You will be asked to come through one door and leave through another. (A one-way system)
- 2. You will be directed to a seat please do not change as they will have been allocated on the numbers attending in any one group.
- 3. You are asked to wear a mask as this will allow a greater number of parishioners to attend.
- 4. Sanitise your hands on entering and leaving the church.
- 5. Do not congregate before or after Mass.
- 6. When receiving Holy Communion nothing will be said.
- 7. There will be no singing; no offertory procession; no sign of Peace; no Chalice.
- 8. At the weekend, there will be a few copies of the newsletter. You are welcome to take one but please DO NOT leave it behind or put it back. Take it home with you.
- 9. Extra directions may be given at Mass.
- 10. On fine days weekday Masses will be outside.
- 11. Please note masks MUST be worn in church. This has been mandated by the Government.

Ministers of the Eucharist and Readers

Eucharistic Ministers

During this period there is no requirement for Special Ministers of the Eucharist at Mass. However, so long as strict guidelines are kept, it may be possible to take Holy Communion to the housebound/ shielding etc. This would need to be discussed with Father Gus and the recipient.

Readers

For the time being there will be ONE reader at all Masses. Weekdays, will remain the same – someone will be asked to read on an ad hoc basis. If any reader is booked to attend a Sunday Mass, they are asked to identify themselves so they can be called upon if necessary.

Unfortunately, the rule for over-70s still applies. When reading, you are asked to sanitise your hands both before and after reading.

Please leave the sanctuary after the Alleluia.

Masses will be at 10.00am each weekday. On Saturday, Mass will be at 5.00pm <u>at Meadowhead</u>. On Sundays it will be at 9.15am and 11.15am at Meadowhead. (Please note that English Martyrs will not be open for the time being.)

If you would like to attend Mass at the weekend you will need to ring up and book a place.
