**This Thursday, 29 August,** is the feast day of the **Passion (the Beheading) of St John the Baptist**. The event is described in the Gospels of Matthew (14: 3-12) and Mark (6: 17-29). Herodias, the wife of King Herod Antipas told her daughter -named as Salome by the Jewish historian Josephus - to require of Herod the head of John as the unspecified gift he had sworn to give her. Herodias hated John for having criticised her marriage to Herod as she had previously been married to his brother Philip. With great reluctance, but bound by his oath, Herod complied.

It is a measure of the importance of John the Baptist that we celebrate both his birth (on 24 June) and his death on 29 August. John the Baptist pointed the way to Christ. His life and death were a giving over of self for God and for other people. His simple style of life was one of complete detachment from earthly possessions.. John challenges us as Christians to the fundamental attitude of Christianity - total dependence on the Father, in Christ. The attractiveness as well as the austerity of John, his fierce courage in denouncing evil - all stem from his fundamental and total placing of his life within the will of God.

This Monday is the feast day of **Blessed Dominic Barberi** (not to be confused with St Dominic, the founder of the Dominican Order) He was born into a farming family in Viterbo, near Rome in 1792. In 1814 he entered the Passionist Novitiate. He had a brilliant mind, and was appointed a professor of philosophy and theology and Superior of several Italian communities.

In his early years, however, it had also been made known to him in prayer that he should preach the word of God in Northern Europe. In 1840 he came to England, and established the first Passionist community in the country at Aston in Staffordshire. After a hostile initial reception, Dominic's goodness and concern for everyone eventually won him acceptance. A very effective preacher, Dominic's parish missions won large numbers of converts. Amongst others, he received John Henry Newman into the Catholic Church. Dominic died on 27 August 1849, and is buried in Sutton, St. Helens, Merseyside. He was beatified in in 1963 during the Second Vatican Council.

#### Mass Setting - Mass of Christ the Saviour

### Gloria 1013; Holy, Holy 1014; Memorial Acclamation 1016-1017; Lamb of God 1019

This Wednesday, 28 August, is the feast day of St Augustine of Hippo. Born in 354 at Thagaste (in modern Algeria), as a young man he led an unsettled life both in the philosophy he professed and in his moral behaviour – much to the grief of his mother Saint Monica (whose feast day is this Tuesday). In the year 387 he was converted and received baptism from the future Saint Ambrose. He returned to his native country and led the life of an ascetic before being made Bishop of Hippo (current Annaba in Algeria). For 34 years he was an exemplary bishop to his flock, teaching his people by his sermons and writings, striving to combat the errors of the time and to make the faith understood. His most famous works are Confessions, City of God and On the Trinity. During his early dissolute life, St Monica was unceasing in her efforts and in her prayers to God for Augustine's conversion. She strengthened her faith by prayer and was outstanding in virtue. Her prayers and her example also won her husband and mother-in-law over to Christianity. She died in Ostia in 387, the year of her son's conversion and Baptism.

St Aidan, whose feast day is on Saturday, was a monk of Irish descent on the Hebridean island of Iona. He came to Northumbria in the 630's at the request of King Oswald (later St Oswald) to evangelise his kingdom. Aidan made his headquarters on the island of Lindisfarne (also known as Holy Island). He died at Bamburgh in 651AD after 16 years as bishop. Subsequent history showed the lasting success of his mission. The missionaries trained in his school on Lindisfarne went out and worked for the conversion of much of Anglo-Saxon England. The feast day also honours many lesser known saints associated with the Lindisfarne foundation.

Thought for the week - Saint Augustine of Hippo recalls his journey to conversion: "Belatedly I loved thee, O Beauty so ancient and so new, belatedly I loved thee. For see, thou wast within and I was without, and I sought thee out there. Unlovely, I rushed heedlessly among the lovely things thou hast made. Thou wast with me, but I was not with thee. These things kept me far from thee; even though they were not at all unless they were in thee. Thou didst call and cry aloud, and didst force open my deafness. Thou didst gleam and shine, and didst chase away my blindness. Thou didst breathe fragrant odours and I drew in my breath; and now I pant for thee. I tasted, and now I hunger and thirst. Thou didst touch me, and I burned for thy peace."
