This Friday, 4 October, is the feast day of Saint Francis of Assisi. Born in 1182 to a prosperous merchant family, Francis renounced his wealth and took the Gospel literally by following all that Jesus did and said. "Announce the kingdom! Possess no gold or silver or copper in your purses, no traveling bag, no sandals, no staff" He preached to all the love of God and the love of the created world, which he recognised as another manifestation of the beauty of God. Hence he is known as the patron saint of ecology. Francis's genuineness and preaching inspired many followers, and he founded the order of wandering preachers who became known as the Franciscans. Two years before his death at the age of 44, he received the stigmata, the real and painful wounds of Christ in his hands, feet and side.

His feast day concludes the Season of Creation, but as Bishop Ralph reminded us in his pastoral letter on 8 September, we are called on as Christians to be good stewards working for the protection of our common home the whole year round.
