Shall I compare Thee to a Summer's Day? Sonnet No.18

William Shakespeare

Shall I compare thee to a summer's day? Thou art more lovely and more temperate. Rough winds do shake the darling buds of May. And summer's lease hath all too short a date. Sometime too hot the eye of heaven shines, And often is his gold complexion dimmed; And every fair from fair sometime declines, By chance, or nature's changing course untrimmed. But thy eternal summer shall not fade Nor lose possession of that fair thou ow'st; Nor shall death brag thou wand'rest in his shade, When in eternal lines to time thou grow'st. So long as men can breathe or eyes can see, So long lives this, and this gives life to thee.

This Thursday, 8 August, is the feast day of St Dominic (sometimes known as St Dominic de Guzmán). Born in Castile in 1170, he trained for the priesthood and became a canon of the cathedral at Osma. In response to the Albigensian (Cathar) heresy, Dominic, with three Cistercians, began itinerant preaching according to the gospel ideal. In 1215 he founded a religious house at Toulouse, the beginning of the Order of Preachers (Dominicans). Like the Franciscans, founded a few years before, the Dominicans put great importance on poverty, both of the individual and of the community, and of the need to be involved directly in the world while still living some form of monastic life. His ideal, and that of his Order, was to link a life with God, study, and prayer in all forms, with a ministry of salvation to people by the word of God.

Little is known of the life of the 3rd century martyr St Lawrence, whose feast day is this Saturday. Yet he is one of those whose martyrdom made a deep and lasting impression on the early Church. Celebration of his feast day spread rapidly. He was a Roman deacon under Pope Saint Sixtus II (whose feast day is this Wednesday). Four days after this pope was put to death, Lawrence and four other clerics also suffered martyrdom, probably during the persecution of the Emperor Valerian.

The Transfiguration of the Lord This Tuesday, 6 August, we celebrate the Feast of **the Transfiguration of the Lord.**

All three Synoptic Gospels tell the story of the Transfiguration (*Matthew 17:1-8; Mark 9:2-9; Luke 9:28-36*) – which we also hear on the Second Sunday of Lent each year. They place the event shortly after Peter's confession of faith that Jesus is the Messiah and Jesus's first prediction of his passion and death. Jesus takes Peter and James and John up a high mountain. There before them he is transformed, dazzlingly bright. Then there appear with him Moses and Elijah. They represent the whole Jewish tradition of the Law and the Prophets. And then out of the cloud comes a voice: it could only be the voice of the Father. "This is my beloved Son; listen to him."

We hear St Peter's own interpretation of the event in the day's Second Reading (2 Peter 1: 16-19)

"It was not any cleverly invented myths that we were repeating when we brought you the knowledge of the power and the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ; we had seen his majesty for ourselves. He was honoured and glorified by God the Father, when the Sublime Glory itself spoke to him and said, 'This is my Son, the Beloved; he enjoys my favour.' We heard this ourselves, spoken from heaven, when we were with him on the holy mountain. So we have confirmation of what was said in prophecies; and you will be right to depend on prophecy and take it as a lamp for lighting a way through the dark until the dawn comes and the morning star rises in your minds." Prayer for the Transfiguration of the Lord

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Father, at the Transfiguration in glory of your Only-Begotten Son, you confirmed the mysteries of faith by the witness to Jesus of the prophets Moses and Elijah. You foreshadowed there what we shall be when you bring our sonship to its perfection. Grant that by listening to the voice of Jesus we may become heirs with him, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever.

This Friday, 9 August, is the feast day of St Teresa Benedicta of the Cross – or as many know her, Edith Stein. A German Jew, born in 1891, Edith sopped believing in God when she was 14, but after reading the autobiography of Teresa of Avila she began a spiritual journey that led to her Baptism in 1922. She imitated Teresa by becoming a Carmelite, taking the name Teresa Benedicta of the Cross. A brilliant philosopher, her writings fill 17 volumes and include translations and interpretations of works by St Thomas Aquinas. The Carmelite Order moved her from Germany to the Netherlands, but when, in 1942 the Dutch Bishops' Conference had a statement read in all churches condemning Nazi racism, the authorities ordered the arrest of all Jewish converts to Christianity. Edith and her sister Rosa died in the gas chamber at Auschwitz. She was canonised by Pope John Paul II in 1999.
