Peace be with you all: Towards an 'unarmed and disarming' peace"

"Peace be with you all. Towards an unarmed and disarming peace" is the theme of Pope Leo XIV's message for the World Day of Peace which was marked on January 1, 2026. The Holy Father invites everyone to welcome peace and become witnesses to it. Peace is a gift that must be safeguarded. The Holy Father recalls that St. Augustine recommends "not to burn bridges or persist in reproach, but to prefer listening and, where possible, engaging in discussions with others"

In order to achieve disarming peace, we must embody meekness because "goodness is disarming. Perhaps this is why God became a child". A child, in all its fragility, could change hearts, question our choices, and lay down our weapons.

Pope Leo reminds us that peace is possible, it is not a utopia, and that ecumenical and interreligious dialogue can help to achieve it. Nor must we forget to embark on "the disarming path of diplomacy, mediation, and international law," which requires mutual trust, loyalty, and responsibility in the commitments we make.

"This is the peace of the risen Christ – a peace that is unarmed and disarming, humble and persevering. It comes from God who loves us all unconditionally "

The Feast of the Epiphany of the Lord

The word Epiphany means "manifestation" or "showing forth." Several moments in Christ's early life and ministry have been celebrated as "epiphanies," including his birth in Bethlehem, the visit of the Magi, his baptism by John, and his first miracle at Cana. The visit of the Magi occurs before the Holy Family's flight into Egypt. It is only recorded in Matthew's Gospel.

We know little about the Magi. They come from the East and journey to Bethlehem, following a unique astrological sign. The Gospel does not say how many Magi paid homage to Jesus. We assume that there were three, based upon the naming of their three gifts. The Magi represent the Gentiles' search for a saviour. Because they represent the entire world, they also represent our search for Jesus.

Their gifts foreshadow of Jesus' role in salvation. Gold is presented as representative of Jesus' kingship.

Frankincense is a symbol of his divinity because priests burned the substance in the Temple. Myrrh, which was used to prepare the dead for burial, is offered in anticipation of Jesus' death.

The Magi fell prostrate before the Christ Child (Matthew 2:11). They laid their lives down before Him in complete surrender and adoration. They set a perfect example for us; to adore Him with a complete surrender of our lives.
