The Terminally Ill Adults (End of Life) Bill, which seeks to legalise assisted suicide, is fast approaching its decisive vote in the House of Commons which will likely take place on either the 13th or 20th of June.

The Catholic bishops of England and Wales oppose this flawed bill both in principle and in practice. They urge us to contact our MP *straight away* to ask them to vote against this bill - even if we have already done so in the past - and to pray that our representatives choose to protect the most vulnerable citizens of this country when they vote.

On the same theme, **Day for Life is** *next Sunday*. The Church teaches that life is to be nurtured from conception to natural death. In England and Wales, *Day for Life* is celebrated on the third Sunday of June each year. The theme is *Hope does not Disappoint: Finding meaning in Suffering*. It is inspired by Romans 5:5-6. St Paul invites us to see that Christian hope is not just naïve optimism but, rather, an unshakeable trust in the power and presence of God who is with us always. This hope can endure the darkness of human suffering and even see beyond it.

Suffering touches every person at some point in their lives. It is often associated with illness, grief, and loss. It is not only caused by physical pain but includes emotional suffering as well as 'soul pain', such as depression and despair. Christians are not immune to this mystery and we often struggle to know how best to respond to it, and where we can find hope.

There will be a retiring collection next weekend for the Day for Life Fund, which provides financial assistance to organisations working to support the Chruch's mission to protect human life.

### **CAFOD Campaign 2025. CANCEL DEBT, CHOOSE HOPE**

The world is currently facing the one of the most acute debt crises in history. 54 countries – from Kenya to Sri Lanka – are facing debt distress.

It's the world's poorest countries who are the worst affected, with many forced to spend more on payments to big banks, wealthy nations and global institutions than they spend on health, education or life-saving climate measures. Often, countries have already re-paid their debts once, but due to unscrupulous lenders and extortionate interest rates, they are often left paying for the original debt many times over. We need to cancel unfair debts, build better financial systems and implement fairer laws to prevent future debt crises.

And the time to act is now! 2025 is a Jubilee year, which is when the Bible calls for debt cancellation to restore justice and human dignity. This Jubilee year, people across the world are uniting in solidarity to demand action on to the debt crisis. Pope Francis said about this, "More than a question of generosity, this is a matter of justice."

Next week you will hear about the petition to be presented to world leaders and which you will be able to sign here .

With the return to "Ordinary Time" we will soon be putting away the striking cloth that decorates the altar during the seasons of Easter and Christmas. **The Millennium Altar Cloth** is one of the great treasures of our church, not least because it was created by members of the parish - in a project to mark the Millennium Jubilee Year 2000. It is fitting, as we celebrate the Jubilee Year 2025, that we pay tribute to the team of eleven parishioners whose practical skills and dedication have gifted our church such a unique decoration.

### Pentecost Sunday - The birthday of the Church

The name "Pentecost" comes from the Greek word meaning "fiftieth." Like Easter, it is tied to a Jewish feast. 49 days (7 weeks, or "a week of weeks") after the second day of Passover, the Jews celebrated the Feast of Weeks (Shavuot). Shavuot was a very good time for the Holy Spirit to come down and inspire the Apostles to preach to all nations because, being a pilgrimage festival, it was an occasion when Jerusalem was filled with pilgrims from many countries.

Passover celebrates the freeing of the Jews from slavery, and the parallel with the Jews is exact. We are freed from the slavery of death and sin by Easter; with the Apostles, we spend some time under the tutelage of the risen Jesus; and when he has left, the Spirit comes down on us and we become a Church.

The Holy Spirit bestows upon us graces such as wisdom, understanding, knowledge, counsel, fortitude, piety and fear of the Lord. The particular way in which the Spirit is given to each person is for a good purpose (1 Corinthians 12:7). We are all equal in dignity but different in calling and manner of service. On this feast of Pentecost we reflect on the personal mission God has given to each of us in building up His Church.

### **Prayer for Pentecost Sunday**

Lord God, who by the mystery of today's great feast sanctify your whole Church in every people and nation, pour out, we pray, the gifts of the Holy Spirit across the face of the earth and, with the divine grace that was at work when the gospel was first proclaimed, fill now once more the hearts of believers.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen
